- **Montebello Unified School District Board of Trustees** welcomes a new partnership with School2Home.
- California leaders are serious about their commitment to Digital Equity in the community and we have important messages from the **California Department of Technology Broadband For All Task Force**, [California State Association of Counties \(CSAC\) President and Riverside County Supervisor, Chuck Washington](#), [Nevada County Board of Supervisors](#), and the **City of San José**.

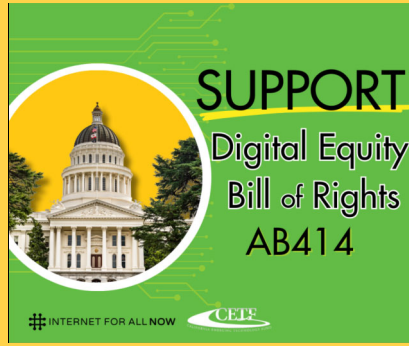

## Take Action Now For Digital Equity

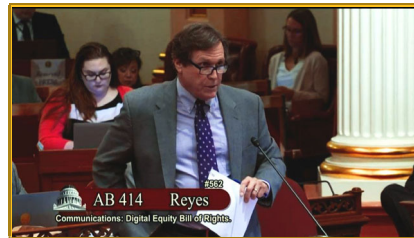

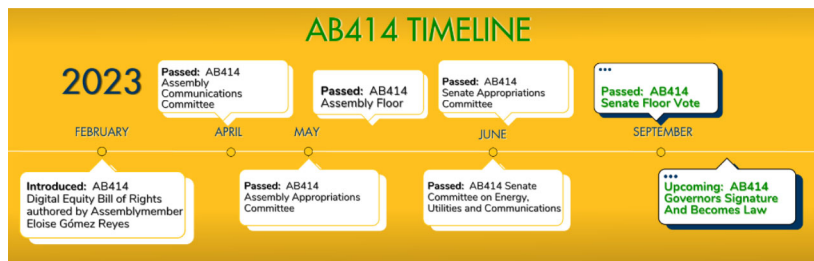

## Latest Findings From PEW-USC-CETF Research Partnership



In July **PEW Charitable Trusts** published the latest findings from a multi-year research project on how **Broadband Subsidy Programs Help Deliver Affordable Internet Access**.

The study is part of a research partnership between CETF, Pew Charitable Trusts, and USC ARNIC to share research results with Internet Service Providers (ISPs), federal regulators, and policymakers about the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) in order to then evaluate the impact of various digital inclusion strategies.

The USC ARNIC leads the Measuring the Effectiveness of Digital Inclusion Approaches (MEDIA) research.

Among the key findings in case studies:

- Through **California's Lifeline** program 87% of ACP program enrollee's qualified through their participation in **Medicaid**, **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program**, or **Supplemental Security Income**.
- A pilot project involving the **Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles (HACLA)** found eligibility in the program was tied to residency and that by eliminating the need to provide additional documentation, more than half of the housed residents stayed enrolled in the program — even after 2 years and even after special budget friendly offers on top of the ACP benefit expired.
- **Riverside Unified School District (RUSD)** in California, found that providing devices and training to students and families led to 98% of students participating in at least one distance learning activity during the pandemic.

In all, these findings show both net additions in subscribers and sustaining service for low-income households is hindered by:

## ACP Enrollments Continue to Climb

California now has exceeded **2.4 million households enrolled in ACP**, which is the largest number of enrollments among all states.



However, there still are 3.4 million households to enroll, which is more than \$1.2 billion annually in ACP benefits that could be claimed by California residents.

Research has shown that the most effective tool for ACP enrollment is Direct Notification by credible sources, such as State Agencies, Counties, County Offices of Education, Higher Education Institutions, Tribal Governments, and Investor-Owned Utilities (IOUs), coupled with having trusted community messengers to reach out directly all ACP-eligible households to notify them of the benefit. These trusted messengers can also coordinate with community-based organizations (CBOs) to provide culturally-competent ACP information.

To make progress in reaching all eligible households, under sponsorship of the California Department of Technology (CDT) and California Broadband Council, CETF in collaboration with CBO's, Grantee Partners, and Local Governments, have hosted **75 Get Connected! California** ACP Enrollment Events this year.

CETF and the Geographical Information Center at Chico State Enterprises (CSE) also maintains the California ACP Enrollment Tracker on the CDT Broadband For All website. This resource provides the most recent data and progress to date on ACP-eligible households in California.

The study concludes that these challenges must be addressed to get every eligible California household enrolled in ACP and connected to affordable home Internet.

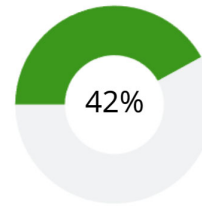

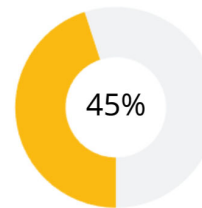

## Your Voice Was Heard by State Officials

### CDT and CPUC Complete 20 Broadband For All, Digital Equity, and BEAD Regional Planning Workshops

CDT and CPUC, in collaboration with GOBiz and other State Agencies, conducted 20 Broadband For All, Digital Equity, and Broadband, Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Regional Planning Workshops between April 14 to June 27—17 in collaboration with Regional Broadband Consortia and other Planning Partners and 3 Consultations with Tribal Leaders. CETF was engaged by CDT to assist with organizing and facilitating the Workshops. Planning Partners distributed invitations to more than 60,000 residents with 2,296 individuals participating. NextGen Policy reached out to 175 community organizations to engage Covered Populations and conduct 3 Focus Groups. CDT will be posting all the Summaries of Recommendations from the Workshops and Tribal Consultations to ensure all information is available and accessible to the public.
